	Including but Not limited to:	non-literature students can serve various purposes such as developing critical thinking skills, encouraging imagination and creativity, create cultural and social awareness, reflect on scientific concepts and ethical considerations, developing communication skills, and cross-disciplinary connections, and enhance literacy. This course introduces science and fantasy fiction (SFF) through reading American, European and Asian short stories and novellas. The course partly examines the interaction between scientific change and the resulting ethical questions as depicted in fictional texts. It looks at the fantasy fiction in social, critical and literary contexts. The course is aimed at honing their cognitive, analytical, linguistic and creative skills. It is hoped that by the end of the semester, the learners will have developed the ability to critically reflect on issue of larger socio-cultural and ethical issues through the appreciation of science and fantasy fiction. This course with its 30:20 pattern will also help in accomplishing this goal.
